Behavior as Communication: Trauma-Informed and Resilience-Focused Behavior Support Plans

This session will focus on understanding behavior as communication and focus on interventions to meet the needs of young people. You will be asked to use a case example from your own experience. You will be given a Trauma-Informed and Resilience-Focused Behavior Support Plan to use. Trauma-informed, resilience-focused practitioners and caregivers do not have a traditional behaviorist mindset. Instead, they view behavior as communication for youth who do not have the words to describe their past and current toxic stress and trauma experiences. Therefore, trying to change behavior is not the focus. Behavior support plans that are trauma-informed and resilience-focused observe behavior with curiosity, exploring not only the behavior itself but the underlying causes for it. They highlight the importance of private logic and universal human needs. Private logic and universal need assessments direct meaningful trauma-informed, resilience-focused behavior support plans that provide opportunities and solutions to help all children and adolescents thrive. This session will guide you through the assessment and behavior support plan writing process.



Kathryn Hart, MA, is the Senior Trainer and Program Consultant for Starr Commonwealth. Kathy trains throughout North America, providing trauma and resilience coaching, consulting, and training to agencies and schools as well as program consultation to Starr Commonwealth. She has dedicated her 28-year career to helping children and families in a variety of capacities. Her experience with youth and family services has encompassed both clinical and administrative roles. She has over 18 years of experience training at Starr Commonwealth in a variety of subjects, including behavior management techniques, trauma and resilience training, Dialectical Behavioral Therapy, and she has been a Certified Trauma Practitioner for 11 years. Promote Hope & Save Lives: Suicide Prevention 101

This session will review the current data and trends related to youth suicide, discuss preventative strategies to apply, identify the signs of suicidal ideation, and explore initial intervention steps to address with those who are contemplating suicide. Also, the presenters will discuss and explore various ways professionals can utilize self-care tools and models to keep themselves safe and healthy while assisting youth and families struggling with suicidal concerns.





Lindsay DeCamp has a background in psychology and healthcare administration with a focus in mental health. She has served as the Program Coordinator for the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services Garrett Lee Smith grant, Transforming Youth Suicide Prevention, since January 2020. Prior to this role, Lindsay worked as the Program Coordinator for the Michigan Mental Health Integration Partnership at the University of Michigan, as well as the Suicide Prevention Program Manager for the Michigan Army National Guard.

An Essential Marriage: Trauma-Informed Resiliency-Based Family Treatment in Residential Treatment Settings

This presentation will identify the key components for integrating family treatment for youth in residential reatment using Trust Based Relational Intervention (TBRI). Dr. Jim Henry, PhD, is a professor and director for Western Michigan University Children's Trauma Assessment Center. His history includes 17 years in child protective services. He has received multiple state awards for his leadership and work in child welfare and trauma. He has testified in over 27 counties and three states as an expert in child trauma, child development, child maltreatment, and child sexual abuse.

The Forgotten Parent: Young Fathers of Color with System Involvement

This keynote will explore how you can institute cross-system collaboration to engage, support, and empower young fathers involved in the juvenile justice system. Through the development of a shared framework for narrative change, young fathers will reshape their stories and see themselves not as statistics, but as loving, family contributors who are worthy of the opportunity to bond with their child(ren). Some of the questions the workshop will explore include: How do we see young men of color? How do we perceive their role as young fathers? And, most importantly, how do programs and services help young fathers of color see themselves as 'At Potential' vs. 'At Risk'?

From a developmental perspective, several theories are relevant to understanding the consequences of parental incarceration. Bowlby's (1973) attachment theory serves as a framework to aid in understanding the importance of the development of the parent-child relationship. Attachment theory proposes that interactions with a primary caregiver during childhood result in episodic memories that form secure or insecure ideas of what a relationship should be in adulthood. Infants can develop strong attachments to their fathers (Parke, 2002), but the lack of opportunity for regular and sustained contact between an infant and father will prevent the development of this attachment, which could detrimentally impact the child (Sroufe, 1997).



Cole Williams is the co-founder of the Delta Project whose mission is to break the generational cycle of incarceration by reconnecting youth of color and their families to community relationships through mentorship, coaching, and storytelling. Cole is the creator of Cole Speaks LLC, a consulting business created to provide professional services and trainings for family court staff and human service workers. He also provides parenting workshops, and individual family coaching for parents who have Juvenile Justice system involvement. Cole was recently appointed to Governor Whitmer's Juvenile Justice Reform Taskforce to support collaborative partnerships between parents and Family Court professionals. He also provides mandated parenting classes for families receiving Juvenile Justice Services through the 17th District Family Court Division in Kent County and the 20th Judicial Circuit Court in Ottawa County. Cole has also developed evidence-based curricula that explore the journey of fatherhood for incarcerated fathers, teen fathers, and fathers in re-entry programing at the Kent County Jail, Kent County Juvenile Detention Center, and Ottawa County Juvenile Justice Services Center in Holland, Michigan. He is a Fatherhood Practitioner for the Michigan Adolescent Pregnancy and Prevention Program and Friend of the Court for the State of Michigan.

Transforming Family Preservation Through Anti-racism Work

Bringing the Protective Factors Framework to Life for Michigan's Family Preservation Programs

During this session, you will receive a brief overview of the five Protective Factors and how they help increase effective parenting and reduce the likelihood of child abuse and neglect within a family. In partnership with Casey Family Programs, a team of eight trainers have become certified by the Children's Trust Fund Alliance to develop a compelling Michigan-based Protective Factors Training Series that will equip workers and supervisors with the knowledge base and skill development to effectively and accurately assess a family's risks and identify effective interventions to help them address those issues using the Protective Factors Framework. You will learn more about what this project means for Michigan Family Preservation and Residential Treatment provider staff across the state.

Theresa Berden, MA, is a Program Manager with Wellspring Lutheran Services, where she has worked for the last 14 years. She currently oversees programs covering 22 counties in northern Michigan. These programs include Families First, Families Together Building Solutions, Foster Care Supportive Visitation, and In Home Family Services.
